Wash hands with soap frequently or use alcohol-based hand sanitizers, especially after you cough, sneeze, or touch your face.
Cover coughs and sneezes with a tissue and dispose of the tissue immediately. If a tissue is not available, cough or sneeze into your inner elbow. (Droplets from a sneeze can travel up to six feet.)

Stay home when sick and do not return to work until twentyfour hours after a fever is gone.

## Smyrna FFA Pitches Landscape Design for Smyrna High School

If you have noticed some changes taking place in the front of Smyrna High School recently, it is most likely in the form of trees being planted as well as decorative planters that have been added to the main entrance and rear entrances of the school. The Smyrna FFA Plant Science III classes have been busy this fall working to design a simple and easily managed landscape plan to make the front of Smyrna High more eye appealing and welcoming.
Last spring, the decorative planters were added to the front and rear entrances of the high school to help with the building aesthetics. All of the planters were grown and designed by Mrs. Kellie Michaud's plant science students.

"The planters were created for graduation and utilized school colors, however, they looked so nice and we wanted to extend their use by placing them around the building throughout the the year," Michaud.
While swapping plants for seasonality in the plant-ers, Michaud's Plant Science III classes pitched an idea to her to create a design with more permanent plants.
Smyrna Senior Alex Dunham stated, "While we were working on the planters we were discussing how plain the building looked and we wanted to do something to make it look nicer and more inviting."
Michaud contacted Smyrna High School Principal, Mrs. Stacy Cook, about the idea and she agreed to listen to the students' presentation and ideas. Their presentation included a detailed to-scale landscape design as well as a power point with pictures of the school with trees, planting beds, and shrubbery added using Pro Landscape software.
"My favorite part is that the entire project is the work of our students. The Plant Science III class came up with the idea. They did the research and planning, and gave a very detailed presentation to myself and others in support of the project," stated Cook.
Mrs. Cook contacted Smyrna School District Superintendent, Mrs. Debbie Wicks, as well as district grounds staff, Mr. George Wicks and Mr. Charles Frazier to come listen to the students' presentation.

The landscape was approved, with Mrs. Wicks stating, "I am delighted to see the Plant Science III students taking ownership of their high school's appearance. These students are working to learn real life lessons and I know they are also looking forward to seeing the results of their labors for years to come."
The landscape will be installed in phases, with the next phase coming this spring as the students install more trees, raised beds, and shrubs around the school's marquee sign. Many of the plants will be coming from the Smyrna FFA Greenhouse that is operated by the students and produces thousands of spring annuals for their

Gabby DiRusso, whose grant was funded by the Monsanto Company, will be utilizing her grant to establish a backyard poultry operation with the goal of producing farm fresh eggs to sell in the community, so her funds will go towards purchasing a chicken coop, fencing, and other supplies necessary to start her operation. Ashley Hurd, whose grant was funded by CF Industries, will be using her grant money to expand her swine production SAE by purchasing two Hampshire gilts (young breeding females) to
show at the Delaware State Fair and breed in the fall with the goal of selling show pigs to $4-\mathrm{H}$ and FFA members in Delaware. Ally Wheatley, whose grant was funded by RaboAgriscience, will be purchasing sexed female Holstein embryos with her grant funds, and working with a veterinarian to implant them into two recipient cows (surrogate moms) from her grandparents' dairy farm, Dulin Brothers Farm. Her goal is to have two young heifer calves born next fall that she can show and then add to the milking herd at the farm.
"We are always looking for new learning opportunities for our students that will prepare them to enter the real world, and I decided that this would be an excellent opportunity for all my upper-level students to gain experience in filling out applications," said Keith Shane, FFA advisor and Animal Science Pathway teacher. "Filling out the applications was a graded assignment, and I told my students that I would submit any students' grant application who wanted to send it on. I submitted four pretty good applications to the National FFA Association, with three winners, so I'm pretty pleased with the results. The other grant must have been in a pretty tough category because I thought that it was good too. All the girls were pretty excited when I called them, and now that the waiting is over, they need to be getting on the phone and making arrangements to get that money spent when it comes in February. And, based on this success, you can bet that I'm doing this assignment again next yea!!"

## NOTICE OF FERPA RIGHTS

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords parents and students over 18 years of age the following rights:

## Inspection

You may inspect the student's education records within 45 days of the day the District receives a request for access. You should submit to the Principal a written request identifying the record(s) you wish to inspect. The Principal will notify you of the time and place of inspection.

## Amendment

If you believe education records are inaccurate, you may request the records be amended. Such a request must be in writing, and directed to the Principal. The request must identify the part of the record you want changed, and specify why it is inaccurate. If the District denies your request, the District will notify you of the decision, advise of the right to a hearing, and provide the hearing procedures.
Consent
You have the right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student's education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without

## A PARENT'S RIGHT TO KNOW

Under the No Child Left Behind Act a parent has the right to know the following information:

" The baccalaureate degree major of the teacher and any graduate certification or degree held by the teacher and the field of discipline of the certification or degree.
» Whether the child is pro vided services by paraprofessionals and if so their qualifications.

The following letter will provide details on how parents may easily access information regarding their child's teacher(s).

## Dear Parent:

As a parent of a student in the Smyrna School District you have the right to know the professional qualifications of the classroom teachers who instruct your child. Federal law allows you to ask for cer-
tain information about your child's classroom teachers, and requires us to give you the information in a timely manner if you ask for it. Specifically, you have the right to ask for the following information about each of your child's classroom teachers:
» Whether the Delaware Department of Education has licensed or qualified the teacher for the grades and subjects he or she teaches.
» Whether the Delaware Department of Educa tion has decided that the teacher can teach in a classroom without being licensed or qualified under state regulations because of special circumstances.
» The teacher's college major; whether the teacher has any advanced degrees and, if so, the subject of the degrees.
» Whether any teachers' aides or similar paraprofessionals provide Title I services to your child and, if they do, their qualifications.

### 2.0 Right to File a Complaint

An organization or an individual may file a complaint regarding an alleged violation of Federal Program Statutes or regulations by the Delaware Department of Education or the Local Education Agency. For purposes of this regulation, a Local Education Agency shall also include charter schools. A written and signed complaint shall be filed with the Delaware Department of Education
2.1 The complaint shall include a statement specifying the alleged violation by the State Edu cation Agency or a Local Education Agency. Such statement shall include facts and doc umentation of the alleged violation.
2.2 The Delaware Department of Education shall investigate the complaint and issue a writ ten report including findings of fact and a decision to the parties included in the complaint within sixty (60) working days of the receipt of the complaint. An extension of the time limit may be made by the Delaware Department of Education only if exceptional circumstances exist with respect to a particular complaint.
2.3 The Delaware Department of Education may conduct an independent onsite investiga tion of the complaint, if it is determined that an on site investigation is necessary.
2.4 The complaint shall allege a violation that occurred not more than one (1) year prior to the date that the complaint is received.

### 3.0 Complaint Made to the Local Education Agency

An organization or an individual is encouraged to file a written, signed complaint with the Local Education Agency, prior to submission of the complaint to the Delaware Department of Education, concerning an alleged violation by the Local Education Agency of a Federal statute or regulation that applies to the Local Education Agency's program.
3.1 The complaint shall include a statement specifying the alleged violation by the Local Edu cation Agency. Such statement shall include facts and documentation of the alleged violation.
3.2 The superintendent or the agency head of the Local Education Agency shall investigate the complaint and issue a written report including findings of fact and a decision to the parties involved in the complaint within sixty (60) working days of the receipt of the com plaint,

3.3 An appeal of the Local Education Agency decision may be made by the complainant to the Delaware Department of Education. The appeal shall be in writing and signed by the individual or by an individual representative of the organization making the appeal The Delaware Department of Education shall resolve the appeal in the same manner as a complaint, as indicated in 2.0.

### 4.0 Review of Final Decision by the U.S. Department of Education

Any party to the complaint has the right to request that the Secretary, U. S. Department of Education, review the final decision of the Delaware Department of Education. Department of Education, shall be made in writing to the Delaware Department of Education within sixty days of the receipt of the decision.
