We have been having lots of fun in physical education the first half of the year! The 3rd and 4th grade s t u d e n t s



started out the year with a lacrosse unit. We practiced cradling, passing, offense, and defense. Then the students completed the state mandated Fitnessgram testing which tests the different components of fitness. Each child received an individual report of how well he/she scored in each area of fitness. We will repeat the test in the spring to see if the scores improve. The 1st and 2nd grade students learned their locomotor skills at the beginning of the year and then moved on to activities that helped make their heart and muscles stronger. We worked on finding our pulse and our resting and working heart rates. Kindergarten has primarily been focused on learning how to move safely in general space and chasing, fleeing, and dodging. Before the holidays, all the students worked on Speedstacking. Speedstacks is a great sport that helps students develop hand-eye coordination, ambidexterity, and hand speed. The students participated in the World SpeedStack Day and helped break the world record! In January, we will be starting the New Year with hockey, bowling, and jump rope units. As the weather starts to get colder, please encourage your child to still exercise outside or in the house. If children are dressed appropriately, there is no reason why they can't get outdoors in the winter and exercise! A PARENT'S RIGHT TO KNOW

Under the **No Child Left Behind Act** a parent has the right to know the following information:

- » The qualifications of the school staff providing instruction to their child.
- » Their child's level of achievement in each state academic assessment.
- Whether their child has been assigned to or has been taught for four or more consecutive weeks by a teacher of a core academic subject who is not highly quali fied.

Upon the parents request the school is to provide the following information:

- Whether the teacher has met state qualifications and licensing criteria for the grade level and subject areas in which the teacher provides instruction.
- » Whether the teacher is teaching under emegency or other provisional status through which state qualification or licensing criteria have been waived.
- The baccalaureate degree major of the teacher and any graduate certification or degree held by the teacher and the field of discipline of the certification or degree.
- Whether the child is provided services by paraprofessionals and if so their qualifications.

The following letter will provide details on how parents may easily access information regarding their child's teacher(s).

Dear Parent:

As a parent of a student in the Smyrna School District you have the right to know the professional qualifications of the classroom teachers who instruct your child. Federal law allows you to ask for certain classroom teachers, and requires us to give you the information in a timely manner if you ask for it. Specifically, you have the right to ask for the following information about each of your child's classroom teachers:

- » Whether the Delaware Department of Education has licensed or qualified the teacher for the grades and subjects he or she teaches.
- Whether the Delaware Department of Education has decided that the teacher can teach in a classroom without being licensed or qualified under state regulations

» Whether any teachers' aides or similar paraprofessionals provide Title I services to your child and, if they do, their qualifications.

200 Administration and Operations 258 Federal Programs General Complaint Procedures*

1.0 Programs Covered by the Complaint Process

This complaint process shall apply to the following programs: Title I Part A Improving Basic Programs Operated by Local Education Agencies; Title I Part B-1 Reading First; Title I Part B-2 Early Reading First; Title I Part B-3 William F. Goodling Even Start Family Literacy Program; Title I Part C Education of Migratory Children; Title I Part D Prevention and Intervention Programs for Children and Youth Who are Neglected, Delinquent, or at Risk; Title I Part F Comprehensive School Reform; Title I Part G Advanced Placement; Title II Part A Teacher and Principal Training and Recruiting Fund, Grants to States; Title II Part A-5-2151(B) School Leadership; Title II Part D 1 and 2 Enhancing Education Through Technology; Title III Language Instruction for Limited English Proficient and Immigrant Students; Title IV Part A Safe and Drug Free Schools and Communities; Title IV Part B 21st Century Community Learning Centers; Title V Part A Innovative Programs and Title V Part B-1 Public Charter Schools.

2.0 Right to File a Complaint

An organization or an individual may file a complaint regarding an alleged violation of Federal Program Statutes or regulations by the Delaware Department of Education or the Local Education Agency. For purposes of this regulation, a Local Education Agency shall also include charter schools. A written and signed complaint shall be filed with the Delaware Department of Education.

- 2.1 The complaint shall include a statement specifying the alleged violation by the State Edu cation Agency or a Local Education Agency. Such statement shall include facts and doc umentation of the alleged violation.
- 2.2 The Delaware Department of Education shall investigate the complaint and issue a writ ten report including findings of fact and a decision to the parties included in the complaint within sixty (60) working days of the receipt of the complaint. An extension of the time limit may be made by the Delaware Department of Education only if exceptional circumstances exist with respect to a particular complaint.
- 2.3 The Delaware Department of Education may conduct an independent onsite investiga tion of the complaint, if it is determined that an on site investigation is necessary.
- 2.4 The complaint shall allege a violation that occurred not more than one (1) year prior to the date that the complaint is received.

3.0 Complaint Made to the Local Education Agency

An organization or an individual is encouraged to file a written, signed complaint with the Local Education Agency, prior to submission of the complaint to the Delaware Department of Education, concerning an alleged violation by the Local Education Agency of a Federal statute or regulation that applies to the Local Education Agency's program.

- 3.1 The complaint shall include a statement specifying the alleged violation by the Local Edu cation Agency. Such statement shall include facts and documentation of the alleged violation.
- 3.2 The superintendent or the agency head of the Local Education Agency shall investigate the complaint and issue a written report including findings of fact and a decision to the parties involved in the complaint within sixty (60) working days of the receipt of the com plaint,
- 3.3 An appeal of the Local Education Agency decision may be made by the complainant to the Delaware Department of Education. The appeal shall be in writing and signed by the individual or by an individual representative of the organization making the appeal. The Delaware Department of Education shall resolve the appeal in the same manner as a complaint, as indicated in 2.0.

Inspection

The Protection of Pupil Rights Amendment affords parents, students who are 18, and emancipated minors the following rights regarding the District's conduct of surveys, collection and use of information for marketing purposes, and certain physical exams.

Protected Information Surveys The District is required to obtain consent permitting your child to participate in certain school activities, or you may

elect to opt out of such activities. These activities, known as protected information surveys, include a student survey, analysis, or evaluation concerning one or more of the following:

- 1. Political affiliations or beliefs of the student or student's parents;
- 2. Mental or psychological problems of the student or student's family;
- 3. Sexual behavior or attitudes;
- 4. Illegal, anti-social, self-incriminating, or demeaning behavior;
- 5. Critical appraisals of others with whom respondents have close family relationships;
- 6. Legally recognized privileged relationships, such as with lawyers, doctors, or ministers;
- 7. Religious practices, affiliations, You may, upon request, inspect the fol-

NOTICE OF FERPA RIGHTS

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords parents and students over 18 years of age the following rights:

Inspection

You may inspect the student's education records within 45 days of the day the District receives a request for access. You should submit to the Principal a written request identifying the record(s) you wish to inspect. The Principal will notify you of the time and place of inspection.

Amendment

If you believe education records are inaccurate, you may request the records be amended. Such a request must be in writing, and directed to the Principal. The request must identify the part of the record you want changed, and specify why it is inaccurate. If the District denies your request, the District will notify you of the decision, advise of the right to a hearing, and provide the hearing procedures.

Consent

You have the right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student's education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent. One exception permits disclosure without consent to school officials with legitimate educational interests. School officials include District employees, Board members, a person or company retained by the District to perform a special task (such as an attorney, auditor, medical consultant, or therapist), or a parent or student serving on a committee or assisting another school official. A school official has a legitimate educational interest if the official needs to review an education record in order to fulfill his or her professional responsibility.

Upon request, the District will disclose education records without consent to officials of another district in which a student seeks or intends to enroll.

Complaint

You may file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by the District to comply with the requirements of FERPA. The name and address of the office that administers FERPA are:

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CHAMPIONS AGAIN!

NEWARK — Leddie Brown stood on the sideline, looked at the sea of red in the away stands and soaked it all in.

This is why he wanted to come to Smyrna High, but he never expected this much.

"I never thought it would be this big," Brown said, gesturing to the crowd. "This whole experience has been amazing for me. I came from a small school, we didn't have all this."

As the Eagles celebrated their second consecutive DIAA Division I football state title Saturday with a 36-14 win over Middletown, Brown was enjoying his first time as a champion.

The junior running back transferred to Smyrna this offseason after his previous school, Eastern Christian Academy in Elkton, Md. closed.

The fact that Brown decided on Smyrna raised some eyebrows. The Eagles already had a standout running back — junior Will Knight, the state's reigning Offensive Player of the Year.

But Smyrna made the dual-running back system work. On Saturday, Knight scored four touchdowns before Brown sealed it on a 16-yard score with 4:40 left.

"You don't know you're going to get another running back until the kid shows up, in the district," said Smyrna coach Mike Judy. "Leddie is a talented young man and I was most impressed about his ability to adapt and find his groove in what we're doing."

"It's very easy for a young man who is very talented to disrupt things," Judy added. "He did not do that one bit. I credit that to the other kids like Will and our seniors for welcoming him into this family."

Knight carried the ball 34 times for 233 rushing yards. Brown was right behind him with 25 carries for 198 yards.

"Those are Division I football players," said Middletown coach Mark DelPercio. "They're scholarship players for a reason. They've got some good players over there."

So why were Brown and Knight able to work together in the same backfield? Brown credits Smyrna offensive coordinator Mike Marks. Marks previously coached with Brown when he was younger.

"Coach Marks is a genius," Brown said.

As a team, the Eagles recorded 471 rushing yards on Saturday.

Smyrna usually isn't afraid to air it out, especially considering the Eagles have an All- State quarterback in Nolan Henderson. But Judy said the circumstances on Saturday dictated some of their decisions.

It was a little windy and Middletown often played just five defenders in the box. Judy also had a lot of confidence in his offensive line.

"I think the offensive line vs. defensive line matchup was in our favor," Judy said. "That was the gameplan."

Typically when Smyrna has both Knight and Brown on the field at the same time, one is in the backfield and the other is in the slot.

Against Middletown, the Eagles turned to their earthquake formation often. It is tightly packed and has Knight receive a direct snap. He can run the ball himself or hand off to Brown.

"They don't know who is getting the ball," Knight said. "It keeps the defense working. I'm thankful for Leddie. We get along very well."

And what impressed Judy the most is that Knight and Brown never argue over carries.

"I came in and we were clicking right away," Brown said. "There's enough ball to go around."

Knight has a knack for title-game heroics.

He scored the tying and go-ahead touchdowns in last year's overtime victory over Salesianum.

Knight was a freshman two years ago when Judy took over a Smyrna program that had gone 2-8 in 2013. He's witnessed firsthand the turnaround from going 5-5 in 2014, to a 9-1 regular season which resulted in a state title a year ago and now an undefeated championship season this year. Knight wanted to make sure last season's championship wasn't the only

Knight wanted to make sure last season's championship wasn't the only one.

"We poured our heart into getting to where we are right now," Knight said. "This shows we are not a fluke or a one and down team. We're here to stay."
