<u>Mrs. Massey's Reading Review</u>

February is here! It is a month full of Valentine's Day activities, Black History Month recognition, and Groundhog Day and President's Day themes and crafts. Seriously, February is packed with amazing learning opportunities!

Did you know February also is "I Love to Read" month? That is right: an entire month dedicated to promoting a love of reading and being read to.

Families can foster a love for reading and support their child's literacy development at home. Here are some ways families can help their children become better readers at home:

- Read aloud to your child: Reading aloud is one of the most effective ways to instill a love for reading and improve literacy skills. Begin reading to your child from an early age and continue even as they become independent readers.
- Set aside regular reading time: Establish a consistent reading routine at home. Set aside a specific time each day dedicated to reading. This can be before bedtime, during meals, or any other suitable time.
- Provide a variety of reading materials: Make sure your home is filled with a
 wide range of reading materials, such as books, magazines, newspapers, and
 even e-books.
- Be a reading role model: Children often emulate the behavior of their parents, so let them see you engaging in reading activities. Model good reading habits by reading in front of your child.
