ESSAY CONTEST

Contestants are asked to write a maximum 500-word essay on the following topic (deadline in January 31, 2005):

Integrity is an adherence to moral and ethical principles; soundness of moral character; honesty.

Think about someone who has integrity. Tell in detail why you chose this particular person, what specific qualities this person possesses, and give specific examples of how he/she demonstrates integrity.

ADULT WINNERS: First (gold), second (silver), and third (bronze) place winners received medals and certificates noting their accomplishments. Winners and runners-up were recognized during the "I Love the Smyrna School District" day (February 26, 2005).

STUDENT WINNERS: First (gold), second (silver), and third (bronze) place winners were selected at each grade level (K-12) in each building. Winners received medals and certificates noting their accomplishments. All winners were recognized during the "I Love the Smyrna School District" day (February 26, 2005).



The following speech was presented in recognition of honored guest Senator James T. Vaughn, Sr. during "I Love the Smyrna School District" day, 2005.

Senator James T. Vaughn, Sr.: A Model of Integrity

Integrity has been defined as uprightness of character, probity, and honesty. It is not a single character trait. It is a collection of traits which combine in a person to produce character. Among the traits which make up integrity are truthfulness, courtesy, humility, commitment, and perseverance.

My father, Senator Vaughn, has always exhibited the highest degree of integrity. It has been described over the years by countless people with phrases, which I have heard many times, such as: "You always knows where he stands," "You can always count on what he says," "If he tells you he is going to do something, he does it," and "He always does what he thinks is right."

He has demonstrated that integrity in thousands of individual, everyday examples. Most of these individual acts of integrity are small and important only to one or a few people who might have been involved in a particular event. To give just one personal example, when I was a young boy, if he told me that he would pitch me batting practice or hit me ground balls when he got home from work, he always kept his promise, no matter how difficult his day might have been or how tired he might be.

But some examples of his integrity are larger. An enduring example of integrity is demonstrated by his dedication to the Smyrna-Clayton Little League program. Through his commitment and perseverance, he was a leader in laying out and constructing the baseball fields and buildings, one after the other, and building up the Little League program over a period of forty years. As a result, thousands of Little Leaguers have had an opportunity to play in an excellent Little League program, hundreds of whom played on the Little League team which he coached.


His integrity was also proven by his tireless work to protect the public safety, first at a Delaware State Trooper and later as Commissioner of the Department of Correction.

During his many years as a member of the school board of this school district, his honesty and commitment served as an example for other school board members to follow. Among many other accomplishments, he led the effort for the construction of this Smyrna High School building and served as board president.

In his current career, he has performed distinguished service as a member of the State Senate. He has served as chairman of important committees, including a session as chairman of the Joint Finance Committee, which made him during that time the senator primarily responsible for the state budget. He is now chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee, which makes him the senator primarily responsible for bills which affect the judicial branch of government.

For these and many other reasons, it is very appropriate that the school district is recognizing him today as a role model for integrity. I am proud to be his son, and I thank the school district for asking me to read my essay on my father and his integrity.


Colleen Henderson First Place, Kindergarten


Gía Ford Second Place, Grade 4
